Small historical museums, such as the Commanda Museum, may not have the resources or recognition of larger institutions, but they play a crucial role in preserving our history and our cultural heritage. These museums provide a unique perspective on local history and preserve cultural heritage. By supporting and preserving these museums, we ensure that our history is not forgotten and can be enjoyed by future generations.

Buildings, artifacts, historical records and official documents may overlook or omit certain aspects of history. By capturing the verbal history of seniors, we can fill these gaps and gain a more comprehensive understanding of the past.

The Genealogy Exhibit at the Commanda Museum captures and shares the stories of local seniors. These stories can inspire and educate future generations as well as teach empathy and resilience and a respect for the area, and the seniors raised in the area.

The following are some edited anecdotes from seniors who have participated in the Genealogy Project:

"All the communities had a community hall and on Saturday nights everyone attended dances, including the children. There were bootleggers out back of the halls, selling illegal alcohol. I remember the day, Constable Fingers arrested my uncle at the Commanda Community Centre and my aunt had to go to pick him up the next day." Arnold Gerhke, 2023, 100 years old

"We had to travel from our farm on Commanda Lake to the school in Carr. My older brother was responsible for arriving early and lighting the woodstove. Depending on the season, we would row across Commanda Lake or walk across the ice or go all the way around by road (it got easier when we all had bicycles to ride)." Rodney Fry, 2023, 93 years old - son living on the original homestead now.

With November being the month we remember and honour our veterans, we should also remember the role that women played in the war effort. One group of women, mostly lost to memory, belonged to a group called the "Farmerette Brigade". The Farmerette Brigade formed during WWII to fill the labour shortage caused by so many men fighting overseas. Between 1941 and 1948, the Farmerette Brigade recruited thousands of young women in Ontario to work on farms on a volunteer basis.
