b) Create a new Genealogy Exhibit. We have been so lucky to have the support of professional videographer, Sabina Hooper of 705blackfly.com, to create a film studio and to train volunteers to capture the stories of the area residents so the Commanda Museum can be a base of personal histories.

c) Trinity Lutheran Church:- In 2016, the Congregation of Trinity Lutheran Church voted to transfer their beloved Church into the care of the Commanda Museum. Seven years have passed as the Museum has struggled to raise funds to perform necessary structural repairs to both the Museum and the Church to allow both buildings to safely open to the public and to preserve them for years to come. The Board of the Commanda Museum is absolutely thrilled to announce that this year there are funds and plans in place to complete structural repairs, and replace the windows and doors at the Church so that the space can be opened as an Exhibit to the public. For those in the Trinity Lutheran Church community, thank you for your patience and your trust in the Commanda Museum, and we look forward to announcing the completion of the necessary projects and then welcoming you to the new space. d) In keeping with one of the objects from the original Mission Statement of 1978 to "promote the local artists and craftsman by providing space for their use", in the spring, we put out a call for all local artisans to display/sell their goods in our gift shop. We had 16 local artisans participate this summer by not only selling their goods but by attending the Commanda Museum to display their skills at workshops/exhibits. A DASH OF HISTORY

PUMPKIN SPICE PUMPKIN

According to Better Homes and Gardens, pumpkin spice doesn't actually include any...pumpkin. Instead, it's a blend of cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, and allspice. It got its name because it is traditionally used to flavor pumpkin recipes.

Pumpkin spice dates back to the Dutch East India Company. The Dutch took control of the Spice Islands (now part of Indonesia) in the early 17th century. Access to the spices inspired the Dutch to create blends such as speculaaskruiden, which is similar to pumpkin spice but also has cardamom and sometimes white pepper. The popularity of speculaaskruiden in Netherlands desserts led to the spices moving across borders.

By 1791, a similar blend called "mixed spices" showed up in The Practice of Cookery, written by a Scottish author only known as "Mrs. Frazer." Mrs. Frazer's blend was called "mixed spices," and included nutmeg, clove, and "Jamaica pepper." She suggested that the blend be used to season flounder or mutton chops. Some things should never include pumpkin spice...but we'll get to that in a minute!

By 1796, the spice blend made it to North America. The first known cookbook to be written by an American, American Cookery by Amelia Simmons, includes a pumpkin spice blend containing mace, nutmeg, and ginger.

Now, who doesn't love pumpkin pie? Pumpkins are one of the earliest domesticated crops on earth and known recipes date back to 1675. McCormick, the world's largest spice seller, introduced a spice mix branded as "pumpkin pie spice" to America in 1934 in response to the invention of pureed canned pumpkin. Since then - cooks have added a dash of pumpkin spice to every dish that's a fall favorite!



SEPTEMBER IN HISTORY

September 16, 1620 - The Mayflower ship departed from England, bound for America with 102 passengers and a small crew. The ship reached Provincetown, Massachusetts on November 21st. The Pilgrims disembarked at Plymouth on December 26th.

September 5, 1847 - Wild West legend Jesse James was born in Centerville, Missouri. Jesse and his brother Frank formed a group of outlaws, robbing banks, trains, stagecoaches and stores. In 1882, after the governor of Missouri offered a \$10,000 reward for their capture dead or alive, a member of the gang shot 34-year-old Jesse and claimed the reward.

September 22, 1862 - President Abraham Lincoln issued a preliminary Emancipation Proclamation freeing the slaves in territories held by Confederates as of January 1, 1863.



September 20, 1867 - Canada holds its first election post-Confederation. Sir John A. Macdonald leads the Conservative Party to victory and becomes our country's first prime minister.

September 1, 1939 - At 5.30 a.m., Hítler's armíes ínvaded Poland startíng World War II ín Europe.

SSeptember 26, 1960 - The fírst-ever televísed presídentíal debate occurred between presídentíal candídates John F. Kennedy and Ríchard M. Níxon.

September 11, 2001 - The worst terroríst attack in U.S. history occurred as four large passenger jets were hijacked then crashed, killing nearly 3,000 people.
