


MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT

We are thrilled to share our first newsletter this year....and in quite some time. There are SO MANY updates and exciting plans but first... a nostalgic look back....

The time is the 1880'sless than a decade away from the Gay Nineties. Alexander Graham Bell has perfected the telephone, and the north is opening in leaps and bounds as families journey to claim their free land grants, following "The Free Grants and Homesteads Act of 1868". The thick forests have come under the loggers axe and camps are almost as numerous as the stands of prime timber they work.

And so they come from the north, by the Moccasin Route. Or, the south, over land by horse, carriage or on foot, up the only road - The Rosseau-Nipissing Colonization Road. One of these ambitious young men is James Arthurs, a young Toronto lawyer - his dream is to build a dry goods emporium at the very centre of all this burgeoning activity in the Village of Commanda.



In 1885, Arthurs builds the Commanda General Store...an imposing two-story structure, with a magnificent false front lavishly embroidered with Victorian Gingerbread and boasting two roof peak flagpoles...it is indeed remarkable to all who shop there.

People come from far and near, to the village - to the McLachlan Brothers for smithing and carpentry, to the Carr Mill for lumber or flour, to the Evers Hotel, for lodging and meals, to the Livery, the Church and School and, perhaps to do business with the local coffin shop and, always, to the Commanda General Store for feed, medicine, staples, woven cloth, mail and, occasionally, a rare luxury that has made its way from Toronto or Montreal.

Now, more than a century later, the only remaining commercial building in Commanda is the ancient store which was saved from destruction by the formation of a charity group in 1979 called "Gurd and Area Historical Corporation".

Over the past 44 years, small groups of volunteers have seemingly performed miracles to save the structures which has allowed the Commanda Museum to be the gem that it is today.



Fast forward 44 years.....no, noslow forwardwhile we give credit to so many hardworking folks.....Claire, Rose, Ruth, Corina, Diane, Kelly, Lisa, Jaimie, Vic, Roberta, Donna, Sharyn James, Arnold, Mr. Beachy, Renee, and so many more, but, I don't know them. So, we have reached 2023 and the Commanda Museum boasts a charming tea room, and a gift shop to rival the best of them, an internet café with an eclectic offering of used books for sale, baked goods, ice cream cones and the best milkshakes, ever. As well, there are two new exhibits in the works - an Indigenous Exhibit and a Genealogy Exhibit, both being actively created as we speak.

Over the years, the Commanda Museum has received generous support from the provincial government in the form of capital improvement grants to complete major restoration projects!

With your support, and the support of every other generous and interested, and interesting (because everyone has a story to share) visitor, to the Commanda Museum, we have been able to meet the financial contributions necessary under the grants but, as you can imagine, keeping the bills paid is an ongoing struggle.
